

Dear Friends

We just finished our 10th WFA low cost drilling school and thought I would share a bit of news. This was our 10th school and the first from our now completely finished WFA drilling camp at Donkey Flats in Paint Rock. It was a great school and we had Delores from Tanzania, Pastor Sam from Ghana, Jon from Tanzania, Nathan a YWAMer from Mexico, Chelsea who goes to Ghana, James and Sara who are headed to Kenya with us next year, and Colin and Ronnie who are headed to Uganda with us. We also had Joey who is Lewis and Barbara Stones son with us who was great. It was a wonderful course and we slept everyone right here in our new finished little cabins on the farm. We now have four little cabins, and even a bathroom cabin with two bathrooms with showers and compost toilets (that worked great and



weren't gross!) We are set and can accommodate up to 11 people right here. We drilled another great well, and had classes on program design for truly equipping the poor with local tools and resources to solve water problems. We built pumps and bits and drilling equipment and water filters. Pastor Sam shared many stories from Ghana and everyone is anxious to get to their countries to start drilling to see learn to help the poor make their own water wells. Nathan who is an ag missionary to Mexico was really fun and we had a lot to talk about sharing experiences and ideas for ministry. We also had some great picking and grinning in the evenings. Kathy cooked great food and we all gained weight. It was wonderful to be able to be "home" while giving the course and not be separated from family.



At the same time I was in contact with our Bolivian program and Teofilo reports more wells clubs than ever. Colin and Ronnie and I were in Bolivia before this last course. I returned just in time to help prepare for the course. When I left a few weeks ago our crew had helped more than 125 families drill their own wells. Rob says the guys in Ethiopia are still drilling and folks

from our last course trained folks that are drilling in Kenya. In Bolivia we are also helping families get windmills and start to raise fish for extra income. The church is also starting a program to help care for untended children and elderly people as they also weekly share God's Word and invite people to follow Christ. Bolivia was wonderful and our guys there are doing so much. So, all is going great with WFA. We are a tiny group but God is sending showers of blessing. Also I have to mention that it rained 2.6 inches the day after the course was over. God is certainly blessing! Praise God for the RAIN!



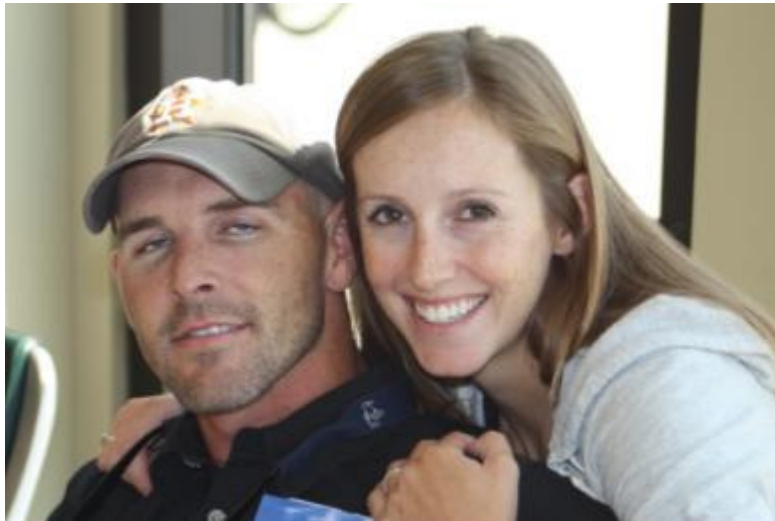

Seeing Delores's pictures and talking to Sam and Jon and Nate reminded me of the desperate plight of so many in the world. They are lacking water while it may be just a few meters under their feet. Pray God will send us more dedicated folks like Colin and Ronnie and James and Sara and Rob and Almaz who are willing to sell everything and go and serve the poor and help them find water right under the feet and share the Good News as they do.

Margarita has her learners permit and is driving to San Angelo and Ballinger. All the goodies of town, wall mart and tractor supply and sonic are only 15 minutes away and they serve good hamburgers even here in Paint Rock at the gas station. We have spoken at the Methodist and Baptist Churches and everyone in town so nice. We go to six man football games on Fridays. A couple is donating a house to WFA, pretty rustic but we will fix it up and it is right at the front gate. James and Sara will live in it I guess. Two bedroom and one bath and big dining room and kitchen. We will put the Flood's donated furniture in it I guess. We have deer and turkey and even a bob cat and porky pine going through the front yard at times that are fun to watch. Marilu has two cats, one got bitten by a rattlesnake on the face but is amazingly ok now. We had a pet orphan deer that Margarita bottle fed but the poor thing got a disease and died later. Quite traumatic for Margarita. But she is loving her school. She took a friend from San Angelo to school with her today who was visiting over the weekend. Only in Paint Rock would they let you do that. So all is well. Southland is still great and we are planning a big thank you barbeque for them. The one we never could find time to do at Skippers. Bolivia is busy as can be. On my recent trip the guys had helped families do 125 wells this year by the time I left. Rob and Almaz are married and happy going to Seminary while they wait for a green card and return in December to Ethiopia. So that is the news. We are excited about you guys going to Lebanon. Sounds great. Joe should do some training in San Angelo late so we hope he gets to hang out with us some when he is here. We have so many request almost overwhelming. Pray for us that we can meet and help as many as possible.
